### SPECIAL EDUCATION AWARENESS

This year, the Hicksville School District was excited to celebrate Special Education Awareness Day. This was on December 2nd; however, since it fell on a Saturday, Hicksville celebrated on Friday December 1st.

Special Education Awareness Day celebrated on December 2nd 2005, marked the 30th anniversary of IDEA (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act). President Ford signed the law on November 29, 1975. This law stipulates that children with disabilities have the same right to a free and appropriate education (FAPE). Between the ages of 3 and 21, there are 13 different areas where a child may qualify for a classification and services through special education.

Hicksville celebrated this monumental day by asking different staff members and students "how they could help someone with a disability". ## GETTING READING FOR ANNUALS

Not only is it holiday season but in the world of Special Education, it also means it's Annual Review season. Many of you may have already received your invitation to your child's annual review either for an IEP or a 504.

As a parent, family member, or guardian, your role at the meeting is a vital one so please make sure you can attend either in person or virtually (or on the phone). If the scheduled date/time is not conducive, please contact the special education office to reschedule the meeting as soon as possible, 516-733-2160.

Try to come with your own notes on your child's progress both at home and in school (your perspective). Additionally, make a list of questions you want to ask. Some of these questions may include "what does this annual goal really measure" or "can my child be recommended for a less restrictive environment" or "do they really require this related service".

To help organize your child's special education paperwork, the district has held a "Build a Binder" workshop for the past two years and it's an effort to help families keep special education paperwork organized for you and your records. If you were not able to attend one of these workshops, you can create your own system or simply keep a folder with all the documents.

If your child receives medical or therapeutic care and the treating physician has information that needs to be included on your child's IEP/504, please have that documentation ready by the date of their annual review.

Something to keep in mind is that the IEP or 504 is a plan to help your child in their area of need and should not provide more than what they need otherwise, we are doing a disservice to them (sometimes more is too much).

## VOCATIONAL 1 STUDENTS CELEBRATE HISPANIC HERITAGE

Hispanic Heritage Month runs from September 15th to October 15th. This year, High School Vocational Level 1 students celebrated Hispanic Heritage Month by learning about and experiencing Hispanic Culture. Students read an article about Hispanic Heritage Month. 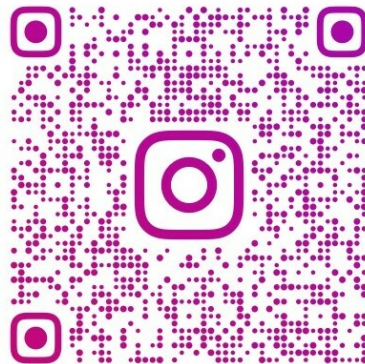
